Section 1. Legal basis

This curriculum has been drawn up under the authority endowed by:

- Ministerial Order no. 1328 of 15 November 2016 on Bachelor' and Master's (Candidatus) Programmes at Universities (*Uddannelsesbekendtgørelsen*)
- Ministerial Order no. 1062 of 30 June 2016 on University Examinations and Grading (Eksamensbekendtgørelsen)
- Ministerial Order no. 114 of 3 February 2015 on the Grading Scale and Other Forms of Assessment of Study Programmes under the Ministry of Higher Education and Science (Karakterbekendtgørelsen).

Part 2. Prescribed period of study and affiliation

Section 2. Prescribed period of study

The bachelor's elective study in English for Academic Purposes is part of a three-year bachelor's programme that equates to 180 ECTS, including a bachelor's elective study prescribed to 45 ECTS and a major subject prescribed to 135 ECTS.

(2) Students must have passed their first-year exam before starting the bachelor's elective study.

Section 3. Affiliation

The bachelor's elective study in English for Academic Purposes falls under the auspices of the study board for English, Germanic and Romance languages and the body of external examiners for English.

Section 4. Reading texts in foreign languages

Texts will be in English only.

Section 5. Definition of a standard page

A standard page is defined in section 7 of the shared curriculum for study programmes at the Faculty of Humanities.

Assessment Internal exam with multiple examiners, the 7-point grading scale. The material accounts for 1/3 of the grade. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: Advanced Learners' Dictionary. Make-up exam/resit: Same as exam if active class participation is not approved.
Special provisions	The approved active class participation is valid within the current exam period. The examination consists of a presentation where the student's oral academic English skills are assessed followed by a discussion with the examiners to clarify and elaborate selected issues.

Teaching and working methods	Course with peer review for written activities.

Exam provisions	Form of exam: Portfolio. Scope: 6-10 standard pages, see Special provisions. Assessment: Internal exam with one examiner, the 7-point grading scale. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: All. Make-up exam/resit: Portfolio, 11-15 standard pages, see Special provisions.
Special provisions	The portfolio consists of various elements, some of which can be oral presentations. The description of these elements and how the elements are evaluated can be found in the course description. To receive feedback on written elements, assignments must be turned in by set deadlines. At the make-up exam/resit, the portfolio must include a 4-5-page answer to an extra task set by the teacher. This answer is in addition to the required elements in the ordinary exam and will cover a topic or an angle that has not been treated in the required elements.

Active class participation consists of: • 2 presentations in class (max. 10 minutes each) Scope: 30 minutes. No preparation time. The material consists of a synopsis of 2-3 standard pages describing three elements: language, technique and structure. Assessment: Internal exam with multiple examiners, the 7-point grading scale. The material accounts for 1/3 of the grade. Active class participation must be approved by the teacher. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: All. Make-up exam/resit: Same as ordinary form of exam.
	Exam if active class participation is not approved: Form of exam: Oral exam with material, optional subject. Scope: 30 minutes. No preparation time. The material consists of a synopsis of 2-3 standard pages describing three elements: language, technique and structure. Assessment Internal exam with multiple examiners, the 7-point grading scale. The material accounts for 1/3 of the grade. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: All. Make-up exam/resit: Same as exam if active class participation is not approved.
Special provisions	The approved active class participation is valid within the current exam period. The examination consists of a 7-minute presentation with a slide show followed by a Q&A session representative of the student's own discipline. The subject of the presentation as well as the form and scope of the material must be approved by the teacher 1 week beforehand.

Section 10. Exemptions

Under special circumstances, the study board may grant exemptions from rules contained in the curriculum that have been set by the study board.

Section 11. Commencement

The curriculum comes into force on 1 September 2019 and applies to students whose bachelor's elective study in English for Academic Purposes commences on or after 1 September 2019.

Section 12. Approval

This curriculum was approved by the Study Board for English, Germanic and Romance languages on 22 August 2018.
