Part 1. Legal basis

Section 1. Legal basis

This curriculum has been drawn up under the authority endowed by:

- Ministerial Order no. 1328 of 15 November 2016 on Bachelor and Master's (Candidatus) Programmes at Universities (*Uddannelsesbekendtgørelsen*)
- Ministerial Order no. 1062 of 30 June 2016 on University Examinations and Grading (*Eksamensbekendtgørelsen*)
- Ministerial Order no. 114 of 3 February 2015 on the Grading Scale and Other Forms of Assessment of Study Programmes under the Ministry of Higher Education and Science (*Karakterbekendtgørelsen*).

Part 2. Prescribed period of study and affiliation

Section 2. Prescribed period of study

The master's elective study in English for Academic Purposes is part of a two-year Master's degree programme equating to 120 ECTS, which includes elective studies equating to 30 ECTS, as well as a major subject of at least 90 ECTS.

Section 3. Affiliation

The master's elective study in English for Academic Purposes falls under the auspices of the study board for English, Germanic and Romance languages and the external examiners for English.

Part 3. Technical requirements pertaining to study

Section 4. Reading texts in foreign languages

Texts will be in English only.

A standard page is defined in section 7 of the shared curriculum for study programmes at the Faculty of Humanities.

Academic targets	At the examination, the student can demonstrate:

Exam provisions	 Form of exam: Portfolio. Scope: 11 -15 standard pages, see Special provisions. Assessment: Internal exam with one examiner, the 7-point grading scale. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: All. Make-up exam/resit: Portfolio, 16-20 standard pages, see Special provisions.
Special provisions	The portfolio consists of various elements, some of which can be oral presen- tations. The description of these elements and how the elements are evalu- ated can be found in the course description. To receive feedback on written elements, assignments must be turned in by set deadlines. At the make-up exam/resit, the portfolio must include a 4-5-page answer to an extra task set by the teacher. This answer is in addition to the required el- ements in the ordinary exam and will cover a topic or an angle that has not been treated in the required elements.

Delivering academic presentations in high proficiency English at the C-1 level and above as defined in the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR). Developing memorable academic presentations which clearly went through a process of: <i>plan, prepare and deliver.</i> Using own research, a high number of references and various sources, and being able to demonstrate critical thinking on the basis of them. Developing material that supports the academic presentation. Knowing how to implement language and presentation techniques to deliver memorable academic presentations. 	
	 Competencies in: Demonstrating excellent proficiency in a wide range of vocabulary, and academic and general language. Working with primary and secondary sources, and being able to demonstrate critical thinking on the basis of them. 	
Teaching and working methods	Course with seminar style teaching in delivering academic presentations and other presentation-related exercises including student presentations.	

Exam provisions	 Type of Exam: Ongoing test. Form of exam: Home assignments and oral exams. Length/duration: Home assignments: 4-10 standard pages, oral exams: 5 minutes and 30 minutes including grading. Grading: 7-point grading scale. Assessment: Internal exam with multiple examiners. The in-class presentation and the written peer review accounts for 25% of the final grade each, and the oral exam accounts for 50%. Regulations for group exams: The exam can only be taken individually. Exam language(s): English. Materials permitted: All. Make-up exam/resit: Subject element exam: Home assignment (optional subject) and oral exam (optional subject). Home assignment: 6-10 standard pages, oral exam: 30 minutes including grading. The home assignment account for 25% and the oral exam accounts for 75% of the final grade.
Special provisions	 The oral exam consists of a 10-minute presentation with a slide show followed by a Q&A session representative of the student's own discipline. The subject of the presentation as well as the form and scope of the material must be approved by the teacher 2 weeks beforehand. The oral exam for the make-up exam/resit consists of a 4-5-minute informative presentation with a slideshow and a 10-minute persuasive presentation with a slideshow. Both presentations will be followed by a Q&A session relevant to the student's discipline. The topic, format, and scope of the presentations must be approved by the teacher at least two weeks in advance.

Under special circumstances, the study board may grant exemptions from rules contained in the curriculum that have been set by the study board.

Section 11. Commencement

This curriculum comes into force on 1 September 2019 and applies to students whose master's elective study in English for Academic Purposes commences on or after 1 September 2019.
