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This programme curriculum is supplemented by the faculty's *Shared curriculum for study programmes at the Faculty of Humanities*. Students enrolled under this curriculum are therefore subject to the guidelines and rules described in both the shared curriculum and the programme curriculum.

### Part 1. Legal basis

#### Section 1. Legal basis

This curriculum has been drawn up under the authority endowed by:

- Ministerial Order no. 2285 of 1 December 2021 on full time Programmes at Universities (*Uddannelsesbekendtgørelsen*)
- Ministerial Order no. 2271 of 1 December 2021 on University Examinations and Grading (*Eksamensbekendtgørelsen*)
- Ministerial Order no. 114 of 3 February 2015 on the Grading Scale and Other Forms of Assessment of Study Programmes under the Ministry of Higher Education and Science (the Grading Scale Order).

### Part 2. Prescribed period of study and affiliation

#### Section 2. Prescribed period of study

The bachelor's elective study in Japan studies constitute 45 ECTS credits that are part of a threeyear bachelor's programme that equates to 180 ECTS. The bachelor courses also comprise an additional 60 ECTS of introductory (propaedeutic) language teaching.

(2) This bachelor elective in Japan studies can only be taken by students enrolled at the BSc in Business, Asian Language and Culture –International Business in Asia at Copenhagen Business School.

#### Section 3. Affiliation

The bachelor's elective study in Japan studies falls under the auspices of the Study Board for Cross-Cultural and Regional Studies and the body of external examiners for Language-based area studies.

### Part 3. Technical requirements pertaining to study

#### Section 4. Reading texts in foreign languages

In addition to the studied language, there will be texts in English.

#### Section 5. Definition of a standard page

A standard page is defined in section 7 of the shared curriculum for study programmes at the Faculty of Humanities.

(2) For the bachelor courses in Japan studies, the following also applies:

1) A standard page of Japanese text is defined as 400 characters. A standard page of kanbun is defined as 300 characters. For poetry the standards are halved to 200 and 150 characters respectively. 2) Film and audio recordings count as one standard page per minute. As audiovisual materials are highly diverse, it is up to the examiner to assess whether the audiovisual materials are appropriate in relation to the syllabus and exams in question. If the audiovisual materials in question are not available to the examiner and censor through the usual channels (libraries, internet resources, etc.), the student is obliged to make them available, if this is deemed to be necessary.

The students follow a study pattern consisting of subject elements composed by the department and can be seen in the table below.

(2) No teaching is offered for the course element Japanese Propaedeutics D, as it is taken in Japan through CBS' exchange via credit-transfer and cooperation agreements, etc.

(3) None of the subject elements can be taken as a stand-alone elective study.

For students who do not take or pass the exam, the approved active class participation is no longer valid after the end of the exam period in question.</li></ul>

#### **Section 10. Exemptions**

The study board may, based on an application, grant exemptions from rules contained in the curriculum that have been set by the university, if special circumstances apply.

#### **Section 11. Commencement**

The curriculum comes into force on 1 September 2022 and applies to students whose bachelor's achelor's elective study in Japan studies for CBS-students commences on or after 1 September 2022.
