## Part 1. Authority

### **1. Authority**

The 2019 curriculum for the subject elements offered by The University of Copenhagen as part of the Master's programme in Urban Studies has been drawn up under the authority endowed by Ministerial Order no. 1389 of 15 December 2011 (Order on the International Education Activities of Universities, Bekendtgørelse om universiteternes internationale uddannelsesforløb).

## **Part 2. Admission requirements**

### 2. Admission requirements

Students are enrolled administratively at Vrije Universiteit Brussels for the two full years. Each semester the students will register at the university offering courses for that semester (2) Only students enrolled at the master programme in Urban Studies can register for the subject elements in the present curriculum.

## Part 4. Structure of the programme

### 5. The Master's programme in Urban Studies

The Master's programme in Urban Studies consists of subject elements totalling 120 ECTS credits, including the thesis.

(2) The programme concludes with a thesis (30 ECTS credits). The thesis must be on a topic within the field of Urban Studies.

(3) Students write their thesis throughout the two years concurrent with the coursework and have to attend mandatory thesis seminars in Vienna, Copenhagen and Madrid. In September at the end of the 4<sup>th</sup> semester, the students will have their Master's Thesis defence at Vrije Universiteit Brussel. The thesis defence is open to the public.

(4) During the semester in Copenhagen, students are required to continue work on their thesis, including conducting research for, and writing and reworking of the draft. There will be group and individual consultations with the Copenhagen staff and/or the thesis supervisor.

(5) The thesis is 30 ECTS credits. The thesis defence concludes the programme.

For administrative purposes the ECTS credits for the thesis are divided equally (5 ECTS credits) among the six partner universities.

(6) The course of study for the Master's programme in Urban Studies is depicted in the table below. The subject elements highlighted in black are those offered at the University of Copenhagen and described in this curriculum.

#### 7.5 ECTS credits Activity code: HURK03012E

Course subject and description	Analysis of architecture and urban structures.
	The aim of this course is to present the main developments of 19th and 20th century European cities and to explore the form and the function of selected types of architecture. Copenhagen is a central reference, but throughout the course these developments will be related to international developments as well. The course addresses themes such as: • Examples of urban planning. • Urban history and the city square as the organizing element of the city. • Responses to the modern decentering of the urban structure. • Modern institutions in the city: parliaments, universities, schools. • Infrastructure: The harbour and the bridges, the train station, the airport and the metro. • Bourgeois culture: museums, theatres, concert houses.
	<ul> <li>Class cultures: the bourgeois family, the working class family, interior decoration.</li> <li>Mass culture: the amusement park, the zoological garden, the panorama, the café, the circus, the cinema.</li> <li>Cultural planning in the experience society.</li> </ul>
	The subject element aims to provide students with competences in analysing works of art and/or artistic and/or cultural and historical currents and questions in the post-1850 period, focusing on historical (political, economic, cultural, intellectual) conditions and developments that transcend art forms, periods and language areas.
	A course will be offered on an urban-history topic (covering problem, motive, theme, period, genre, etc.). The teaching will include supervision for the written examination, which will take the form of the presentation and discussion of a problem formulation and the assignment text.

#### 7.5 ECTS credits Activity code: HURK03022E

Course subject and description	Urbanity and aesthetics
	A course is being offered on problems and tendencies in the theory of cultural science. The course covers cultural phenomena as well as relevant cultural science academic texts, including method and theory texts. This course aims at establishing the basic principles for a humanistic and culture-theoretical approach to the city considered as urban culture. The course delves into seminal texts from the traditions of 20th-century cultural theory in order to outline key principles that allow us to understand the city as urbanity, i.e. as a complex cultural phenomenon.
	Three approaches are in focus: 1) that of a Copenhagen interdisciplinary research environment in architec- ture, sociology and the humanities (second half of the 20th century); 2) that of Paris thinkers and writers (from the 1970s); and 3) that of Berlin and critical theory (in the 1930s).
	While the Copenhagen scholars focus on issues of "Perception and Lifeworld", Paris intellectuals emphasize the importance of "Movements and Text". Fi- nally, prominent Berlin writers (Siegfried Kracauer and Walter Benjamin) ex- plore the socio-cultural logics of "Spaces and Memory". The course is in- formed by French literary and cultural scholar Roland Barthes who pointed out the essential roles of signification in the city – a realm that far too often is reduced to discourses of functionality.
	Aims and objectives: The subject element aims to provide students with competences that enable them to reflect in a methodical and theoretical manner on problems in the subjects of urbanity and aesthetics, through analytical work with theoretical texts and cultural phenomena in the field.

Types of instruction and work	A course is being offered on problems and tendencies in the theory of cultural science. The course covers cultural phenomena as well as relevant cultural science academic texts, including method and theory texts. #### **5 ECTS credits** Activity code: HURK03032E

Course subject and description	<ul> <li>Modern urbanity, urbanity and aesthetics</li> <li>Principles for the interdisciplinary analysis of modern urbanity will be developed and tested in case-studies addressing the differentiated spatial and socio-cultural reality of a metropolitan region such as Copenhagen around 2000. Special emphasis will be put on issues of urban architecture and public spaces within the tradition of Danish Modern.</li> <li>A number of professional and academic approaches to the present development of the urban field will be illustrated during this course which will take place on the spot – i. e. in selected areas of the Copenhagen metropolitan region representing 'Historical Copenhagen*, 'Modernist Copenhagen', 'Suburban Copenhagen' and 'Regional Copenhagen' - including Southern Sweden (Malmö, Scania).</li> </ul>
Academic objectives	<ul> <li>For the examination, students: <ul> <li>identify significant, fundamental characteristics of a cultural phenomenon in the subjects of urbanity and aesthetics, and communicate them in a lucid and intelligible oral form</li> <li>conduct an empirical analysis of key cultural phenomena in the subjects of urbanity and aesthetics</li> <li>adopt a reasoned position on methods of analysis and techniques in the subjects urbanity and aesthetics.</li> </ul> </li> <li>By means of empirical work with texts and cultural phenomena, the subject element aims at providing students skills to reflect on methodological, theoretical or analytical issues in the subjects of urbanity and aesthetics. In addition, the students are invited to reflect on the selection of sites for urban analysis as well as on the possible creative representation of these sites within a contemporary version of the modern guidebook.</li> </ul>

The thesis is written throughout the two years concurrently with the coursework with mandatory thesis seminars in Vienna, Copenhagen and Madrid.

(2) During the semester in Copenhagen students are expected to continue work on the thesis. Besides the mandatory thesis seminar the work includes planning of the research and writing, reading and reworking the draft as well as group and individual consultations with the Copenhagen staff and/or the thesis supervisor.

(3) The thesis weighs 30 ECTS credits which are awarded following the successful thesis defence. For administrative purposes the 30 ECTS credits are divided equally (5 ECTS credits) among the partner universities. The 5 ECTS credits are registered only as the full 30 ECTS credits thesis is successfully passed by the student. Subject element: Thesis (partial credits) 5 ECTS credits, Activity code: XXX, Pass/fail. The registration is done by Education and Student Services after receiving confirmation that the thesis is successfully passed.

### Part 5. Commencement, exemption and approval

#### 7. Commencement

The 2019 curriculum for the subject elements offered by The University of Copenhagen as part of Master's programme in Urban Studies comes into force on 1 September 2019 and applies to students who are enrolled in the Master's programme on 1 September 2019 or later.

### 8. Exemption

Under special circumstances, the Study Board may grant exemptions from those rules contained in the curriculum that have been set by the board itself.

### 9. Approval

The curriculum has been approved by the Study Board for the Department of Arts and Cultural Studies on 11 June 2019.
